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AutoAction: AUTO ACTION'S 2023 PRE spain formula 1 team-by-team event guide

AFTER RAIN CAUSED SOME MAYHEM IN MONACO, THE FORMULA 1 WORLD WILL SETTLE DOWN AT THE SPANISH GRAND PRIX.

THE ANNUAL trip to the familiar Circuit de Barcelona-Catalunya usually marks the start of the European leg of the championship, but it arrives slightly later than usual.

Being round 8 of the season, the 2023 race will be just the second Spanish Grand Prix at the Catalan circuit held in the month of June.

The later start could bring weather into the mix with the forecast predicting a first wet Spanish Grand Prix since Michael Schumacher's famous first Ferrari win in 1996.

Not only has the date changed, but also the track with the unpopular chicane created back in 2007 finally ditched.

This means the famously fast double right-handed bends to end the lap return, which should make setting up overtakes down the long main straight easier in addition to rapidly reducing lap times and simply enhancing the spectacle.

The driver who last won a Spanish Grand Prix without the chicane was fittingly Fernando Alonso, and the huge crowd expected to pack stands and banks would love nothing more than seeing their home hero break his victory drought.

Whilst that win arrived during his Renault days, Alonso's last Grand Prix victory also occurred a decade ago for Ferrari.

Having collected five podiums in six races this year, he has never had a better chance to break the drought than now at Aston Martin.

But challenging the Red Bull at the flowing Spanish circuit will be much tougher than the twisty Monte Carlo.

The track's style should suit the RB19 down to a tee and the reigning champions also cruised to a 1-2 last year.

But Max Verstappen's victory over Sergio Perez was much harder in

reality than on paper, with the eventual winner flying into the gravel at Turn 4 and only gaining the lead after an engine blow up for Charles Leclerc.

Verstappen's 2022 success ended a streak of Mercedes domination at the circuit with the Silver Arrows recording five straight wins and nine consecutive pole positions.

In 2023 Mercedes has not possessed the outright speed to challenge for wins and have started from scratch after bringing a revised aero package to Monaco.

With the "zero-pod" design gone, Mercedes' new design received the tick of approval from both Lewis Hamilton and George Russell and will be put to the ultimate test in Spain.

If things click, Mercedes could steal second from Aston Martin in the teams championship, while it is also a big weekend for Ferrari.

Last year Spain was the scene for the Scuderia's title hopes going up in smoke, but 12 months on it is optimistic a potentially seasondefining upgrade can find some speed and consistency after collecting just one podium from the first six races.

Alpine could be a dark horse after Esteban Ocon's podium gave the building team the perfect breakthrough.

Like Monaco, qualifying is critical at Catalunya, with 29 of the 32 winners starting from the front row.

But for the second week in a row, rain could spice things up, which is something highly unusual for Spain.



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
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EIGHT SPANISH GRAND PRIX JUNE 2-4

TEAM PRINCIPAL CHRISTIAN HORNER

Max Verstappen strengthened his grip on the 2023 title in emphatic style at Monaco. Somehow stole pole with a scintillating final sector before converting it into a gritty second win at the Principality. Now heads to one of his favourite tracks where he went off and still won last year. Has only missed the Spanish podium once since his maiden win in 2016.

TEAM PRINCIPAL MIKE KRACK

Fernando Alonso returns to home soil with his greatest chance of victory since his last also at Spain a decade ago. Now at Aston Martin, Alonso is in peak form after scoring his first P2 in 3227 days at Monaco, which could have been even better if it was not for an extra stop, but challenging for victory could be a tougher task at Catalunya.



TEAM PRINCIPAL TOTO WOLFF

Now armed with sidepods, George Russell showed strong signs on Sunday at the Monaco GP. Despite moving up three spots from eighth to fifth, Russell was "kicking himself" after a mistake at Mirabeau cost him a sensational maiden 2023 podium. Enjoyed a memorable battle with Verstappen on his way to third at Spain last year.



TEAM PRINCIPAL FRED VASSEUR

The 2023 Monaco Grand Prix was the latest of a string of disappointing races for Charles Leclerc. This time a three-place grid penalty for impeding Norris meant he could do little but settle for sixth. Spain was where his title hopes literally blew up in smoke and will be aiming for a maiden podium at the track.



TEAM PRINCIPAL OTMAR SZAFNAUER

Esteban Ocon flies into Spain on a high after scoring his first podium in 39 races at Monaco. "Estie bestie" soared to third off the back of a strong qualifying effort which helped him rise from 12th to ninth in the championship. Scored fifth in his first ever trip to Spain and has the confidence to better it.

TEAM PRINCIPAL CHRISTIAN HORNER

Sergio Perez believes he must be "perfect" after his Monaco GP defence could not have gone any worse. A heavy crash in qualifying restricted him to start last and could only make up four spots to 16th in the rain. Catalunya is not his favourite track either, with last year his only podium.



Spain is one of Lewis Hamilton's favourite tracks and he hopes to continue his consistency. Came within 2s of a Monaco podium after a strong Sunday despite a crash at FP3 and starting sixth. The result is a further boost ahead of a track he has won the equal amount of races at. A second podium of '23 is not out of the question.



TEAM PRINCIPAL FRED VASSEUR

Ferrari's Carlos Sainz arrives on home territory on the back foot. Lost four positions on his way to finishing eighth at Monaco highlighted by a clumsy move on Ocon which resulted in front wing damage and an off at Mirabeau. Sainz's only top five finish in Spain arrived last year despite a spin.



TEAM PRINCIPAL MIKE KRACK

Lance Stroll is searching for confidence after two poor races in a row and he hopes to reverse the trend in Spain. After a pointless Miami, Stroll failed to finish in Monaco where he was eliminated in Q2 and had a string of race incidents. Only has one points finish at Catalunya, but it was a solid P4 in 2020.



TEAM PRINCIPAL OTMAR SZAFNAUER

As his teammate stole the headlines with a sensational podium, Pierre Gasly also scored his best result for Alpine of seventh. However, it could have been better having sat third when rain arrived, only to get a new set of dries, forcing another stop to drop further back. Has the chance to better his Spain best if he can maximise his Alpine package.

TEAM PRINCIPAL GUENTHER STEINER

Nico Hulkeberg hopes to put a tough Monaco behind him and rebound well in Spain. In a forgetful race for Haas, Hulkenberg was the penultimate finisher in 17th, two laps down after collecting two costly time penalties. Despite the battles, the German is more optimistic Spain will suit the Haas better.



TEAM PRINCIPAL ALESSANDRO ALUNNI BRAVI

Valtteri Bottas was one of the big movers in Monaco, climbing four spots to be on the cusp of a second points finish of the year. Although he is yet to win at Spain, it has always been one of his most consistent tracks with the Finn being sixth or better in all bar one of the races staged there since his debut season.



TEAM PRINCIPAL FRANZ TOST

Monaco was a tale of what could have been for Yuki Tsunoda. The Japanese driver showed decent pace throughout the weekend and looked set for a third points finish of the year until brake dramas saw him limp to 15th. Would love to repeat his P10 from last year.



TEAM PRINCIPAL JAMES VOWLES

After recovering from a heavy FP1 crash to score his second straight P14. Alexander Albon is hoping the track changes to Spain could "help us be a bit more competitive". Despite qualifying a solid 13th, Albon endured a "boring" race in Monaco. Only has one points finish at Catalunya.





forward to the opportunity of racing on a familiar race track. Sargeant has raced at Catalunya on 14 separate occasions across the junior formulas and hopes this experience can help him start on the front foot for Williams after battling in the rain.

TEAM PRINCIPAL ZAC BROWN

Despite returning to the points, Lando Norris has slipped out of the top 10 in the championship. Norris bounced back from a disappointing Miami to collect handy points for McLaren. After failing to finish on Spanish debut due to a clash with Stroll, Norris has not missed the points there since.



TEAM PRINCIPAL ZAC BROWN

Even with the toughest of conditions thrown at him, Oscar Piastri showed great grit and composure on Monaco Grand Prix debut. Piastri stayed out of trouble to follow his teammate and collect a second career points finish. Has previously won at Catalunya at Formula 3 level.



TEAM PRINCIPAL ALESSANDRO ALUNNI BRAVI

Despite collecting four speeding penalties across the Monaco weekend, Zhou Guanyu would like to continue taking steps forward. After a tough Miami, Zhou recorded his second best finish of the season at Monaco with 13th. But both he wants more as the Chinese racer aims for his first finish in Spain after mechanical dramas cut his race short last year.



TEAM PRINCIPAL GUENTHER STEINER

Despite "trying everything" Haas and Kevin Magnussen struggled to make an impression in Monaco. The strong outing in Miami was quickly forgotten as Magnussen failed to finish following a race littered with off-track excursions after electing to stay on the dries as the rain fell. Only has two points finishes from seven Spanish Grands Prix.



Monaco was a much needed step in the right direction for Nyck de Vries. He recorded his best qualifying result and best finish for AlphaTauri of 12th at the Principality and even finished ahead of his teammate for the first time. Hopes to continue his form at a track where he scored the first victory of his triumphant F2 season at.
